






#### Q: Tell us something about yourself.

I'm Tracey Smith, the Author of Jordyn's Journeys children's book series, and I write books about my granddaughter's journeys. I titled the series after her and named it Jordyn's Journeys. The series consists of 4 books, and 2 coloring and workbooks. I published my first book in January of 2022.

In late 2024, a children's affirmation book was added to the series, and a mother-daughter duo was created. My daughter, Angie Smith, and I co-authored Jordyn's A to Z Affirmation Book: Daily Inspiration & Motivation for Kids. In this book, Jordyn embarks on a journey with her cousin, exploring the letters of the alphabet and providing daily inspiration and motivation to young readers aged 5-11.

#### Q: Tell us why you decided to add an affirmation book to the series.

Writing the affirmation book was actually my daughter's idea, so we decided to work together creating a book to motivate and inspire kids to think big every day. My daughter and I wanted the book to be for all kids, so a new character was added to the series, who is Jordyn's cousin. His name is Jordan. They are the same age and the best of friends. They are like two peas in a pod.

#### Q: Tell us more about the children's affirmation book and when it was published.

Jordyn's A to Z Affirmation book was published in December 2024. In this book, Jordyn and Jordan go on a magical journey together, taking turns dreaming about their future and who and what they can become one day. For example, they both aspire to become a doctor, as well as the owner of their own business one day, but they express it in their own way.

#### Q: Tell us about some of the other books in your series.

#### O: How did these stories and characters come to be?


My granddaughter is the main character in my books and has a busy life, like most kids her age, so writing about her life journeys is rewarding, since I get to live it right alongside her.

The return to my first love began with a single chapter—as a co-author in Upward: Leadership Lessons for Women on the Rise. That experience reignited my creative spark and gave me the confidence to tell even bigger stories.

From there, I released my debut business book, Heels to Deals: How Women Are Dominating in Business-to-Business Sales, a project that celebrated women rewriting the rules in traditionally male-dominated spaces. And then, at 65, I fulfilled a dream I had carried for decades: I became a children's book author and released my debut book, I Have a Voice: A Book of Listening —a gift to the next generation and a reflection of my mission to build confidence, compassion, and empowerment in

With two more children's books on the way, I see writing not just as a career or a calling —but as a legacy. A way to use my voice to help others find theirs.

#### Q: When did you write your first story? Is it published or not?

I wrote my first story in 2024. It was released for a soft launch during the Holidays and a formal national book launch in April, 2025. Yes, it is published on Amazon, Barnes & Noble and through Ingram Spark, available wherever books are sold. It is also available in select book stores.

#### Q: Tell us something more about your books.

My books are centered around one mission: to empower children to know their worth, honor their uniqueness, and become compassionate, confident members of their communities.


My debut children's book, I Have a Voice: A Book of Listening, invites children to tune into their inner voice—and to recognize the importance of giving space and support to those whose voices may go unheard. It's a story about empathy, self-worth, and the power of being present. I want every child who reads it to feel seen, valued, and reminded that their voice matters deeply.

Following this message of self-awareness and kindness, I have two more books on the way that expand

Just a Dot? I Think Not! A Book of Connection (coming Fall 2025) explores the beauty of individuality and how, when seen through the lens of unity and understanding, we are all part of something greater. It's a joyful invitation to celebrate both our differences and our shared humanity.

More Than Pretty: A Book of Inner Beauty (coming Q1 2026) will challenge narrow definitions of beauty and help children—especially girls—understand that their value lies not in appearance, but in their courage, kindness, and inner light.

Each book is created with intention, shaped by values of diversity, equity, and inclusion, and grounded in the belief that early storytelling can plant seeds of lifelong empowerment. I see these stories as part of a larger legacy—to not just tell better stories, but to raise better storytellers.



This is one of my favorite questions—especially because it often comes from curious young readers!

In I Have a Voice, the main character, Victoria, was inspired by a very special little girl—the daughter of a close friend whom I've been mentoring since she was just three years old. Watching her grow, learn, and develop her own voice has been one of the most beautiful experiences in my life.

Viktor, the voice monster, came straight from my imagination! I wanted to create a character with universal appeal— a "monster" that was both fun and a little mischievous, who could connect with both boys and girls. Viktor supports Victoria, even when she may enter the darkness and helps bring the idea of self-doubt or hesitation to life in a playful, approachable way.

But the heart of the story really comes from my own childhood. I grew up in a time when kids—especially girls—were expected to be seen and not heard. That silence stayed with me for a long time. Writing this book was my way of rewriting that narrative for the next generation. I wanted to show kids that not only is it okay to speak up—it's necessary. Their voices matter. They matter.

#### Q: Do you want to leave any message for your readers?

To my readers, young and grown:

Know this: you matter. Your voice matters. Your story matters.

Whether you're a child discovering the strength in speaking up for the first time or an adult reconnecting with your inner light, I want you to remember that you hold the power to create change, within yourself, in your community, and beyond.

My hope is that these stories remind you to lead with kindness, listen with empathy, and move through the world with courage. You don't need permission to take up space. You already belong.

And if there's one thing I hope lingers in your heart long after the last page: You are not "just" anything. You are enough. You are becoming. And you are part of something greater.

Thank you for allowing my words and my story to be part of your journey. I'm deeply honored.



#### Q: First tell us something about yourself.

I have a background in special education and spent my career working in the private sector with individuals with developmental disabilities and mental health struggles. The favorite part of my career was developing and providing trainings for parents on how to manage difficult behaviors in their neurodivergent children. After I retired, I took the time to develop my hobbies. I love to garden, hike, fish, kayak, cook, and read. I have always been musical and enjoy singing and playing the piano. I have been married for twenty years to my best friend and partner, Lon. In order to marry, we traveled to Canada because same-sex marriage was illegal in our state, and not a protected right in the USA at that time. I brought two children into our marriage and Lon has been a wonderful stepparent. Our children have always said we have the most traditional, nontraditional relationship they have ever seen. This is probably because Lon sees herself as much more masculine than feminine. Our journey has been enlightening, loving, and amazing. We don't get caught up in pronouns, but we do choose traditional male/female roles. I share this because it is the reason Avery, our granddaughter, asked a very big question..... "Is Opa a Girl?"

#### Q: How and when did your journey start as a writer?

I became a grandma in 2020 to a delightful and precocious red-headed little girl, Avery. I am now a grandmother to two delightful and precocious little girls. I have been lovingly blessed with the German name for grandma, "Oma", and my spouse is called, "Opa." When Avery turned three years old, she began to ask questions that were difficult to answer. For example, questions about religion, death, gender, and aging. I found myself wondering how to teach these large concepts to young children in a way that would not be confusing, but would also teach acceptance and kindness for all types of diversity. I decided Avery needed a book...so I spent a few hours looking for one that did not teach a child how and what to believe or think, but rather taught concepts in a simple manner that allowed the child and parent together to explore their beliefs at their own pace. I could not find anything that fit what I was wanting - so I decided to write the book myself.

#### Q: When did you write your first story? Is it published or not?

One of the first questions Avery asked was about the concept of church. Her parents do not attend a specific church and consider themselves agnostic, and therefore, she was confused by this term.

# Is Opa a Girl?

What happens when a child asks a question that doesn't have a simple answer?

In Is Opa a Girl?, curious and inquisitive Avery wants to understand something new, something big. She's fishing with her Opa when she suddenly asks a very direct question: "Are you a girl?"

What follows is a thoughtful, age-appropriate conversation about gender identity, the difference between how we look on the outside and how we feel on the inside, and the importance of embracing people just as they are.

My daughter asked for my opinion on how to teach the concept of church to Avery, and how to help her learn to be accepting of all types of religion. Thus, "The Precocious Child – A Very Big Question Book" series was born with my first book, "What is Church?" It is published and available in paperback, hardback, and E-book through common sites such as Amazon, Barnes and Noble, Foyles, etc. along with the second book in the series, "Is Opa a Girl?"

#### Q: Tell us something more about your books.

My books are my passion project. Anytime Avery asks a question that makes us all pause, I start thinking about creating another book to address the issue. From the first question, "What is Church?", to the next one, "Is Opa a Girl?", I hope to continue to write books that are worthy of Avery's curiosity. The latest question involves GG, my mother and Avery's Great Grandmother. She has dementia and has physically struggled over the last couple of years. Recently, Avery asked me, "Is GG going to die?" This is another complicated question to answer for a four-year-old. My first thought was to say, "Yes, everyone dies." Then I had visions of Avery attending pre-school and telling all of her little friends that they were all going to die! Perhaps, I thought, this answer needed to have a bit more finesse. In ruminating about this question, I came to the conclusion that the next book in my series will be about the aging process. I hope to have it available by next Spring.

#### Q: How did these stories and characters come to your mind?

In the Precocious Child series, all of the characters are inspired by my family. The illustrations, the characters' interests, and the questions addressed are all based on real people, real questions, and real events. When Avery asks a question that makes me think...I pause and ask myself, "Is this the title to my next book in the series?"

#### Q: Do you want to leave any message for your readers?





#### Q: First tell us something about yourself.

I am originally from Teoc, Mississippi. I now live in Cabot, Arkansas and I am an Army Veteran, Wife, Mom of two amazing little girls, Registered Oncology Nurse, and now published children's author.

#### Q: When did your journey start as a writer?

My journey as a writer started as a kid when my father was sick. I used writing poetry and stories as a way to escape from the reality that my father was not going to get better. I put down writing after he passed, but picked it back up in the Fall of 2023 when I wrote my first children's book, The Mysterious Smell That Didn't Sit So Well.

#### Q: When did you write your first story? Is it published or not?

I wrote my first story in the Fall of 2023 and it was published in January 2024. My second one was published in April of 2024.

#### Q: Tell us something more about your books.

My books are relatable to people who have children, pets, or just everyday life. My first two children's books are rhyming books meant to help children learn to read, identify rhymes, and learn about their senses in a fun way while using their critical thinking skills. A thing that sets my books apart is that they have plot twists that help develop those critical thinking skills early while solving funny mysteries. The books are colorful and keep kids engaged.


#### Q: How did these stories and characters come to your mind?

The books are based on my own little family and our family pets. It makes the stories more relatable to have them based on a real family with adding some fun imagination in them as well. The first book started because my oldest child left her cereal bowl in the sink without rinsing it out or using the disposal. She had placed something on top of it and I was working nights at the hospital at the time, so when I came home, I smelt a horrible smell and spent a while looking for it. It gave me an idea for a story, so I sat down and within a few hours, I had my first children's book. I decided to make it a series, so The Mysterious Taste, But I'm Not Supposed To Waste was next because my oldest daughter, again, can be a picky eater. I decided to explore it through the mind and imagination of a child and the reasons why she might not want to eat the food she was given. I will finish up this series with the other three senses, but have a few stand alone books coming out as well, like my third children's book coming out soon, A Dog Named Kitty.

#### Q: Do you want to leave any message for your readers?

Reading is an adventure and can be fun. It can be your escape and your safe place. Reading is a passport to endless possibilities. I encourage each of my readers to embrace life and see where it can take them, because it doesn't matter where you came from, it matters where you decide to go!

I come from a big family and I always felt very different. I am a day dreamer who aims to realize her dreams. I am pretty courageous and always go back to my feet. Do not take my kindness nor my smile for granted and do not think I am naive... Life taught me the hard way to always trust my instinct. I have come a long way and I am pretty proud that my inner child is still intact, against all odds. I am the proud mother of four children, aged between 4 and 14, whom I consider my best friends and daily inspiration.

#### Q: What's your favorite part about being a children's author?

I wanted to write children's books because I believe that at a young age, books have the power to affect children in a positive way. For some children, reading books is their only way of escaping this world's harsh realities! These stories, these books, help them to imagine a world that is different and helps them to etch positive memories in their hearts for themselves and the rest of their lives. I remember reading Biff and Chip books, a very popular book when I was young, and how it made me feel like I could go on any adventure. Then, when I was able to read books for older children, I would stick my nose in Roald Dahl books for hours! I would get so carried away, that everything around me would disappear.

#### Q: How and when did your journey start as a writer?

Writing has been a part of my life ever since I was a young. I would always write short stories, poems and I did a lot of journaling, expressing my thoughts and feelings. As a teenager I found it hard to express my feelings verbally without it coming out the wrong way or with a different meaning to what I meant it to be, so I would write to get my point across. My parents always encouraged me to read and write. My mother saw the importance in it as I had to learn how to speak and perfect my English language after we emigrated to the UK. My stepfather would sit with me for hours, encouraging me to read and immerse myself into the stories. He would tell me to really imagine myself in the stories. I read and use my imagination and creativity to write too. "Write anything, a story, how you feel, whether it be sad, happy or angry. The skies are the limit!" He would say.

#### Q: When did you write your first story? Is it published or not?

I wrote my first story when I was 14 years old. I remember going to WH Smiths, buying an A5 sized notebook to write the story in. I wrote about a teenage girl who was navigating life through her teenage years. She discovered things about herself, her friends and dark secrets about her family that tore her entire life apart! Everything she thought she knew, vanished! I coupled the story with a few awfully drawn pictures too (I thought I was an artiste!) Unfortunately, it was never published, but who knows?

I might go into my mothers house and search through the family archive she has in her room and dig out that notepad. Going through that family archive will be an adventure in itself (might find some embarrassing stuff)!

#### Q: Your stories show siblings cooperating. Do you think more stories need to show families working together?

Absolutely! I think it is important for children to be shown that families working together is the best thing ever! It is even more important for them to see families that may not be represented in our books as much as we would like, like single-parent families for example. They need to know that families come in all different shapes, sizes and colours and that they are all normal and perfectly capable of being a stable, loving and happy family.


#### Q: How did these stories and characters come to your mind?

My children are behind the stories and characters in my books. They have a 12 and a half year age gap but still have an amazing relationship. When my son was still a baby, my daughter would read to him, play with him, pretending to be a duck for example or a lion (I have footage as proof lol). He loved playing and being read to by his big sister. Seeing their relationship blossom with time is what encouraged me to finally write "The Adventures of Yaya and Tee Tee"! My son's first word was Yaya as he didn't know how to say her name properly. Until this day, as soon as he returns home from Daycare, he runs to her room to check if she is back home yet. He also gives her a kiss and cuddles goodnight before his bedtime.

#### Q: Do you want to leave any message for your readers?

Read, explore, imagine! Don't be afraid to reach for the stars! You can make your dreams come true if you work hard for it! Don't be afraid to be creative, imaginative, and to be you! You are awesome and loved! Parents, encourage your children to read and expand their imagination. It will teach them lifelong skills that they will be able to use in relationships, at school, at work, and in everyday life! It sure helped me!



























































## THEDREAMFAIRY
